The Turners published three books from the collection: <u>The English Ancestry of Thomas Stoughton of Windsor, Connecticut; Stoughton Footprints in the Sands of Time and Wisconsin Page Pioneer Kinsfolk</u>. All branches of the Stoughton family in America are descended from the Thomas Stoughton who is the subject of their first book.

The cornerstone of the collection is the data on the Stoughton family brought together by Mr. Bradley Stoughton, a metallurgical engineer, while living in New York City. Beginning in 1909 he cast a nation-wide net to learn the names and places of residence of the Stoughton and related families. This correspondence brought in much original

material on the Stoughton and other families which Bradley Stoughton used in compiling a series of Stoughton family genealogies. There are also supporting Stoughton materials
